NOW THROUGH April 1st - Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art: Two Exhibitions, One Price! Admission to *Dreams of the Kings: A Jade Suit for Eternity* will include an additional ticket to view *Through the Eyes of Picasso* good for one visit through April 1, 2018.

Treasures of the Han Dynasty from Xuzhou. Featured objects include exquisite vessels fashioned from solid jade, a full suit of iron armor, a spectacular solid gold belt buckle and a magnificent, 2,000-year-old, life-sized jade and gold burial suit that is the finest to have survived from ancient China. The objects were excavated from a group of monumental tombs of the Kings of Chu that were carved into rocky hillsides in an area midway between Beijing and Shanghai.

In adjacent galleries will be displayed a selection of 90 pieces from the museum's celebrated collection of early Chinese art from the Shang (16th century—ca. 1046 B.C.E.) to the Han (206 B.C.E.—220 C.E.) dynasties. The display will include the world-famous jade bi ritual disc and many other exceptional pieces.

Comment from our past President Norm Onnen: My wife and I viewed the "Dream of Kings" exhibit and were greatly impressed by the quality and comprehensive nature of this splendid collection of jade, bronze and pottery artifacts of the Chu kings (Han dynasty) from over 2,000 years ago. Of primary interest were the numerous jade items, all hand carved/sculpted and polished by court artisans. The precise design and fabrication of the individual pieces had to have taken many years given the exceptional hardness of jade. This exhibit will be at the Nelson-Atkins Gallery through April 1, 2018 and will then be disassembled and items returned to their respective venues. Please consider visiting this exceptional exhibit prior to closure.

NOW THROUGH MAY 28th "MODERN DINOSAURS?" Prairiefire Museum 5801 W. 135th St. OPKS 66223 (913) 333-3500. Modern Dinosaurs? explores how mysterious beasts became familiar icons. Encounter full-size dinosaur skeletons, scientific instruments, original letters and works that fueled a scientific revolution. Discover natural selection in the age of the dinosaurs as you consider the evidence indicating birds descended from dinosaurs and as a result, should be considered modern dinosaurs. Several interactive stations are also a part of the exhibit. While Prairiefire is affiliated with the American Museum of Natural History in New York, this is the first exhibit that is an outside collaboration with Triebold Paleontology.




Blade and Bone: The Discovery of Human Antiquity



In 1800, it was generally believed that humans were a relatively recent addition to the earth, dating back some 6000 years. By 1920, it was commonly understood that humans had been on earth for a very long time, had lived in rock shelters and used tools fashioned from flint, and had expressed themselves artistically in bone carvings and cave paintings. This exhibition documents the discovery of human antiquity as presented in the original books and journals.

"The Tazza": "The [Tazza](#)", one of the largest pieces of [malachite](#) in North America. Czar Nicholas II presented the gift of a great malachite tazza to the American Ambassador to Russia, August Heckscher, in 1910. The tazza became part of the Heckscher Museum of Art collection, where it resided for many years. The tazza was rediscovered in the art and antiques marketplace and purchased for the Linda Hall Library near the UMKC campus by Mrs. Kenneth Spencer in 1972.

Malachite, a mineral often found in oxidized zones of copper ore deposits, was found abundantly in the Ural Mountains of Russia. Other significant deposits have been found in France, Israel, Mexico, and Arizona. It often occurs with azurite. The Linda Hall tazza is considered to be one of the four most important pieces of green malachite in the world, according to art historians, and the largest in the U.S. The remarkable piece measures 6 feet, 6 inches from its base to its rim. The saucer measures nearly 5 feet in diameter.
